- 2. A resulting trust is not subject to these statutory requirements. [WRITING]
- 5. If this type of property is left over, an automatic resulting trust comes into existence. [SURPLUS]
- 7. Non disposal of the beneficial interest gives rise to this type of resulting trust. [AUTOMATIC]
- 8. Resulting trusts and another type of trust are very similar since they are both imposed by law and not subject to the statutory writing requirements.
 [CONSTRUCTIVE]
- 9. This presumption is often involved when property is purchased in the name of children. [ADVANCEMENT]

- 1. When an express trust does this, an automatic resulting trust comes into existence. [FAILS]
- 3. Apart from the presumption of advancement, Nelson v Nelson (1995) 184 CLR 538 also involved this issue. [ILLEGALITY]
- 4. This type of resulting trust caused significant concern when it was identified by the House of Lords in 1970. [QUISTCLOSE]
- 6. There is a presumption involving this when property is purchased in the name of another person. [INTENTION]
