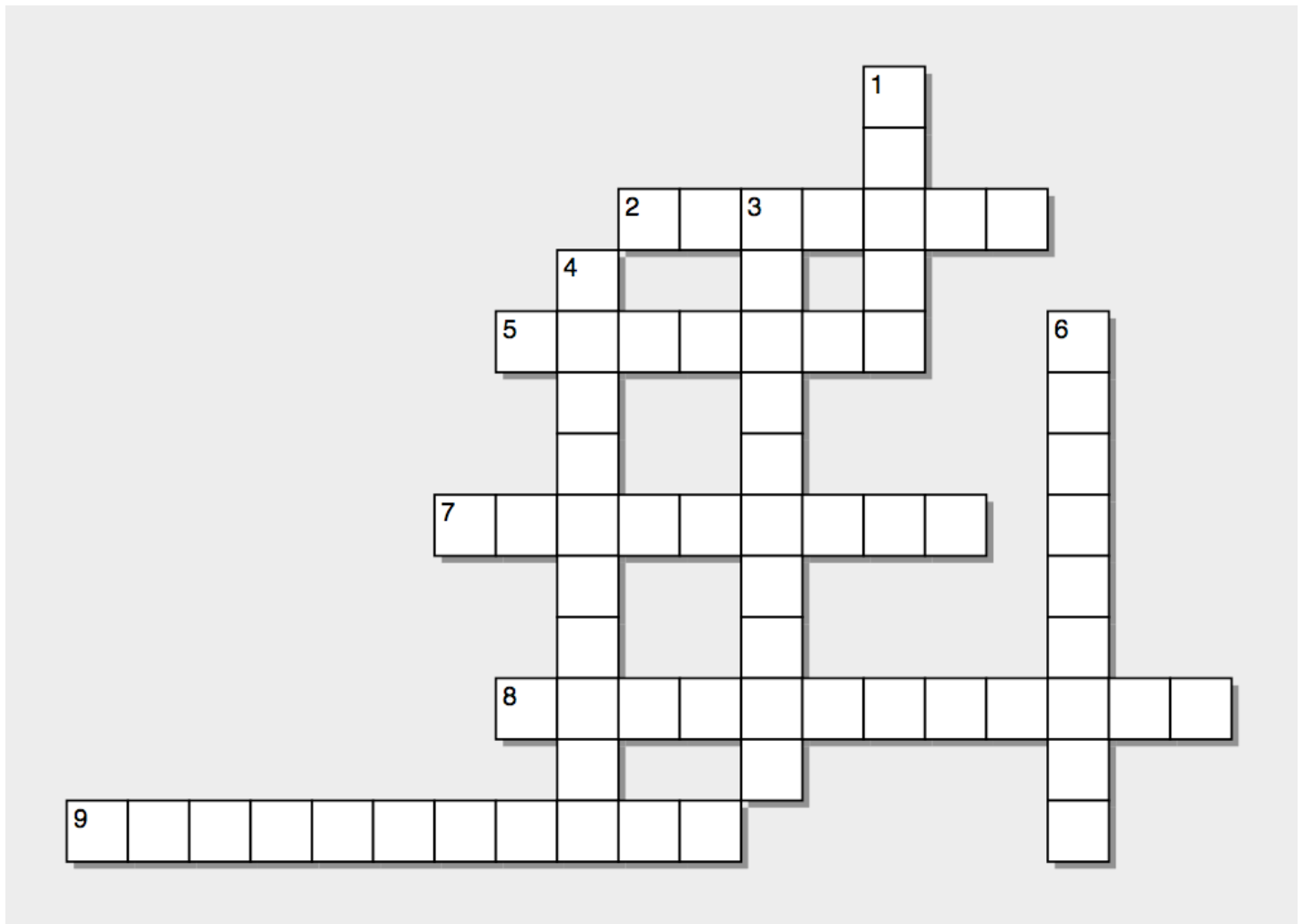


Chapter 8: Resulting Trusts

2. A resulting trust is not subject to these statutory requirements.
5. If this type of property is left over, an automatic resulting trust comes into existence.
7. Non disposal of the beneficial interest gives rise to this type of resulting trust.
8. Resulting trusts and another type of trust are very similar since they are both imposed by law and not subject to the statutory writing requirements.
9. This presumption is often involved when property is purchased in the name of children.

1. When an express trust does this, an automatic resulting trust comes into existence.
3. Apart from the presumption of advancement, *Nelson v Nelson* (1995) 184 CLR 538 also involved this issue.
4. This type of resulting trust caused significant concern when it was identified by the House of Lords in 1970.
6. There is a presumption involving this when property is purchased in the name of another person.
